

Profiles

WAYNE KIRSCH (Fred Graham)

Wayne is a Ball State University graduate who teaches math and computer science at East Central High School in addition to working with the junior high drama department. JEANNE WELLBAUM (Lilli Vanessi/Katharine)

Jeanne is a Lima, Ohio native and graduate of Ohio University. While in college she performed with the touring university singers. Wellbaum has also performed with the Cincinnati May Festival Chorus, Lima Civic Chorus and Madrigals. She is the membership chairman of the Rivertown Players and performed in "Fiddler on the Roof".

LINDA RECHTIN (Lois Lane/Bianca)

Linda performed during her college days at Miami University with a group of university singers who travelled to Europe. She is a music teacher at St. Mary's and has written three musicals for her students to perform. Rechtin has also performed in musicals including "Fiddler on the Roof" and has sung with the Dearborn County Community Choir and with the Christian singing group "Truth".

TONY DIETRICH (Bill Calhoun/Lucentio)

Tony graduated from the University of Kentucky and Xavier University and teaches English at South Dearborn High School. Dietrich's first experience with performing was in "Fiddler on the Roof" last summer. He is a member of the nominating committee of the Rivertown Players.

He performed in "West Side Story", "Bye Bye Birdie" and played Mr. Frank in "The Diary of Anne Frank". Hall, a sophomore music major at Ball State University, also was a part of the "Fiddler on the Roof" cast.

NINA KLEINE (Hattie)

Nina is a 1983 graduate of South Dearborn High School where she was active in the theatre and music departments. She has studied voice with Linda Rechtin and Darryl Berry and next fall will enter Miami University as a vocal performance major. Nina has also been active in the Hamline Madrigal singers and community choir.

Bob was involved in productions during his high school days and now has a daughter who is involved in drama at East Central High School. He was a member of the Colerain Drama Guild and has sung in choral groups. Bob's most recent role outside of "Kiss Me Kate" was in "Fiddler on the Roof".

Branigan is a teacher and coach at East Central High School where he has directed "The Crucible", "Damned Yankees" and other shows. For the last nine years, Branigan has been at ECHS and he is the head of the communicative arts department. Branigan says it seems like he has always been performing and he likes an audience.

DARRYL BERRY (Musical Director)

Darryl was active in music during his college days at Miami University in groups such as Men's Glee Club, Opera Theatre, Symphonic Orchestra and more. He has also performed with the Dixieland group at Kings Island, taught music and performed with the Madrigal singers. Berry had the leading part of Tevye in the CAI production of "Fiddler on the Roof".

DIANE HADLEY (Choreographer)

Diane has been teaching dancing since her Michigan State University days when she did it to make money to put herself through college. Diane has studied several kinds of dance including tap and ballet and she says her favorite is interpretive dancing. In 1981, Hadley opened her own exercise studio where she teaches aerobic dance.
