PROFILES



MARY ALICE BALL (Reno Sweeney)
Miss Ball, a Lawrenceburg resident, shares her
talents as a teacher at Central Elementary
School. Her stage talents were developed in
"South Pacific", "A Merry Regiment of Women",
and "You Can't Take It With You". Mary Alice
expects Reno to become her favorite character
since it is a complete opposite of herself and
previous characters she has portrayed. In addition
to acting, Miss Ball has worked behind the
scenes for RTP. An imaginary cruise to England
has occupied the summer of 1987, but Mary
Alice also enjoys reading, crafts, working out,
and preparing special foods.



DARRYL BERRY (Moonface Martin)
Returning to his homebase of Cincinnati, Darryl
is now teaching middle school music in the
Lakota Schools at West Chester, Ohio. A member
of RTP since its inception, Mr. Berry has portrayed
Tevye in "Fiddler on the Roof", Fagin in the
musical "Oliver", E. K. Hornbeck in "Inherit the
Wind" and Emile De Beque in "South Pacific".
Although Darryl's favorite character is Tevye, he
likes the fun of the character Moonface. He
especially enjoyed his role as director of the
Hillforest Murder Mysteries. Mr. Berry currently
serves as a member of the Board of Directors of
Rivertown Players.



KIM HASSAN (Hope Harcourt)
Kim, a sophomore at LHS, returns to the RTP
stage following an earlier appearance in the
Young People's Playhouse presentation of "Snow
White and the Seven Dwarts". Active in high

in "Fools" she found most enjoyable. Miss

BOB HEBEL (E. J. Whitney)
A favorite with RTP audiences, Mr. Hebel has played a variety of roles in such productions as "Kiss Me Kate", "Oliver", and "South Pacific" in which he portrayed the unforgettable Luther Billis, the "ladies man' of the tropics. His character in this production resembles Luther in that E. J. also has a flair for the ladies as well as the spirits. DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Tonight's story began three months ago in New York City. Two mutually attracted young people left a party to drive around Central Park in an open taxi. Romance was in the air and on the second time around, they kissed. Nine hours later she felt that things were moving too fast, so while he was busy borrowing money for the taxi-fare, she slipped away without a trace. As we pick up the story tonight, we see passengers boarding the ocean liner "S. S. American", bound for London.

The original story of "Anything Goes" was a lighthearted musical about a shipwreck and its effects on some colorful characters. However, just before rehearsals began, the S.S. Morro Castle" burned at sea and sank, with a loss of over a hundred lives. Obviously the show had to be altered. The authors scrapped the wreck situation, but kept the distinctive characters aboard a luxury liner. The show finally opened at the Alvin Theatre on November 21, 1934, and starred Victor Moore, Ethel Merman, and William Gaxton. The show ran for 420 performances. A revival of "Anything Goes" opened at the Orpheum Theatre on May 15, 1962, featuring Mickey Deems, Eileen Rodgers, and Hal Linden. The new producers added even more punch to the show by including six more top Cole Porter tunes. The show won the New York Outer Circle Critics' Award for best revival of 1962.

"Anything Goes" is most famous for its "ribald and sentimental songs", written by Cole Porter. Born in Indiana, Porter became one of America's greatest composers, best known for his close-harmonic scores and humorous lyrics. Music lovers will not want to miss the special White House tribute to Cole Porter to be broadcast on PBS next Wednesday, July 29.

Tonight's performance of "Anything Goes" features a very talented group of performers. They have been hard-working, willing to try new tricks and techniques, and patient at putting up with my occasional tirades. To the production staff, crews, orchestra, and cast, I extend by deepest gratitude and love. Without each one of them, this production would not have been possible. And to you, our audience, a very special thanks for allowing us to exercise our special art and for supporting it so appreciatively.
